Club boats only available to helms who have demonstrated the appropriate sailing skills. First Aid equipment on safety boat and in club house	Inexperienced sailors or those with medical condition to wear head protection at their discretion	Low



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Hypothermia resulting from immersion or exposure.	Loss of consciousness, death Medium	Sailors	Appropriate clothing / hat / gloves / dry suit or wetsuit to be worn. Safety boat in attendance. 'Space blankets' available on safety boat and at clubhouse	Sailors to ensure own welfare and to retire if affected to a degree that would hinder their recovery from capsize or impair safety.	Low
Illness due to water contamination	Death / disability Low	Sailors and all those in contact with water and surrounding banks etc.	Sailors to cover cuts with waterproof plasters. Refer members and visitors to 'RYA Guidance on Blue Green Algae' and 'RYA Guidance on Weil's disease' posted on clubhouse Health and safety notice board.	Club members to be aware of potential hazard and need to state they have been in contact with lake water area if seeking medical advice.	Low

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Injuries from contact with booms, flapping sails or mast whilst boats alongside jetty.	Head, eye or other injuries Medium if windy, low if not	Sailors and those on the jetty	The boat helms to keep a good look out. Ensure boats are unattended for minimum time unless secured so as not to present a hazard	Assess level of risk for conditions	Low
Injuries from slipping / tripping on or falling from jetty	Head injuries, fractures, bruising drowning. Drowning low, other medium	People who use the jetty	Non-slip surfacing installed. Gate to be kept shut, signage in place warning no access to members of the public. Buoyancy aid to be worn on jetty. OOD to ensure jetty cleared of slipping hazards prior to races. First Aid equipment on safety boat and in club house	Users to remove any unnecessary slipping or tripping hazards. Appropriate footwear to be worn.	Low



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Capsize resulting in inability to right or stranding of dinghy (e.g. mast stuck in the mud when inverted)	Crew in water for substantial time. See risk assessments ante. for drowning and hypothermia. High to Low depending on type of dinghy, strength and ability of crew	Dinghy owners and sailors	Safety boat on standby to assist crew with recovery. Owners /sailors to ensure sufficient buoyancy carried or built in to ensure dinghy floatation in all reasonable circumstances.	Crews to ensure they are familiar with capsize recovery procedures for the craft sailed. Novices recommended to use masthead buoyancy to reduce risk of inversion.	Low
Dinghy gear failure resulting in inability to maneuver	Capsize, stranding or presenting a hazard to other craft resulting in personal injury. Low	Sailors	Owners / users to ensure craft in proper condition to sail. Safety boat in attendance. Paddle to be carried.	Crew to check operation of gear before launch	Low
Collision with other dinghies	Personal injury and damage to boats High to Medium for inexperienced sailors, Low for experienced	Sailors	Observation of the rules of Sailing is mandatory and must be obeyed by all crews. Third party insurance must be held.	Crews to take all reasonable precautions to avoid contact with other boats	Low



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Unsuitable weather conditions including deterioration of weather and lightning strikes	Numbers of dinghies in difficulties with crews unable to self-recover Medium to high in severe conditions	Sailors	OOD to cancel / abandon or shorten events as dictated by the weather conditions. Abandonment mandatory if risk of lightening	Helms are responsible for ensuring that they, their crew and boat are suited to the conditions at the time and should retire if in doubt	Low
High temperatures and strong sunshine	Heatstroke / sunburn / Eye damage Medium	Sailors / safety boat crews / spectators	High SPF sunscreen / hats / sunglasses with high UV rating to be worn. Exposed skin to be covered and sufficient fluid intake	Individual to assess level of risk for conditions.	Low
